

2021 was a year where health inequality was starkly illustrated by the COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic demonstrated the critical need for the global community to improve its collective approach to global health. Countries and communities most affected by global health challenges remain in the 'backseat' of the current global health architecture. Rich countries and regional power blocs often impede equitable access to healthcare.

Ensuring that global health is a political priority for France and the European Union (EU) and that they account for their commitments remained a major focus in 2021. We concentrated on health equity and access – specifically the inequalities illustrated through the lens of COVID-19, and we engaged with new partners to deepen our work and enable us to focus on a wider set of issues.

GHA also broadened its focus during 2021. We launched our first campaign on sexual and reproductive health and rights, 'EssentiELLES' at the Generation Equality Forum. We continued our long-term cooperation with the ACTION advocacy partnership, raising the political profile of global health in twelve countries across the world. We kick-started our strategy renewal process for 2022-2027, with a new strategy to be launched during 2022.

COVID-19: ensuring health equity and access

whith 88% of people living in low-income countries still unvaccinated, GHA called on France and the EU to remove intellectual property barriers that prevent scaling up and diversifying production of affordable vaccines. The pandemic highlights the need to consider health as a global public good, to prioritize people over profit, to ensure equitable access to health products and ressources and to improve global health governance.

COVID-19 recovery was at the top of every political agenda, with many donors – including the EU and France – supporting the Access to COVID-19 Tools (ACT) Accelerator, a global collaboration mechanism aiming to accelerate the development, the production, and equitable access to COVID-19 tools. However, the funding of the mechanism was essential to fulfill its mission.

RESULTS:

- GHA was invited to the Elysée prior to the Carbis Bay G7 Summit, with six other NGOs, to dialogue with the French President Emmanuel Macron. He shared GHA's call to do more in the global fight against COVID-19, by saying that intellectual property rights must not hinder access to vaccines during a pandemic.
- By mid 2022, the European Commission pledged 1.2 billion USD to the ACT Accelerator.

GHA together with partners <u>called on</u> the <u>EU to meet their 'fair share'</u> and contribute an additional £1.3 billion from its flexibility instruments - a budget line planned for emergencies. Similarly, GHA <u>called on France to do its part by making financial contributions in addition to dose donations.</u>



Meeting with Emmanuel Macron at the Elysee: GHA coordinated civil society discussions on the Covid response in France and advocated for stronger involvement of France to the Access to Covid Tools Accelerator (ACT-A), including the need to temporarily lift Intellectual Property rules (the so-called TRIPS Waiver) and to support increased manufacturing capacities in Africa.

GHA and its partners pointed out G7 countries' responsibility for vaccine inequity, as they have been blocking negotiations at the WTO to waive intellectual property barriers to upscaling affordable & accessible vaccines production.

Enhancing governance and accountability of public research funding for health

he mobilisation of public funds for research and development of vaccines and treatments has been unprecedented and it highlighted the extremely important and needed role that the public can play in biomedical research. In this context, governments need to introduce policies that promote transparency and equity in their relations with the pharmaceutical industry and enable greater accountability for public R&D spending.



GHA issued a discussion paper that explores the role of equity in the pandemic preparedness and response (PPR) political dialogue, through an analysis of current and future global health mechanisms, identifying shortcomings in the global health governance architecture. Read more.



RESULTS:

Throughout sustained pressure in the framework of the **Social Security Financing Bill** (PLFSS) that led to the adoption provisions requiring pharmaceutical companies to disclose the amount of R&D related public subsidies they received each vear.

GHA provided inputs to cabinet of the Minister Health on the drafting of the implementation decree.

Enabling partnership with southern partners

he 6th European Union summit aimed to renew the relationship between FU and the African Union but the EU's position was not up to the task in terms of supporting better health. Many southern Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) are mobilised to foster commitments from governments and donors and make progress on sustained and qualitative access to health services for all. GHA has developed a rich partnership with ASAPSU in Côte d'Ivoire, supporting them in their national and regional advocacy.


RESULTS:

Health Systems is one of the pillar of the Global Gateway investment package announced by the EC during the EU/Africa Summit.

WACI Health was invited to speak on community health during the Slovenian Presidency's EU-Africa health event. GHA with other CSOs called for a 6th partnership pillar on health.

Breaking the silos

HA worked more broadly on global health challenges with a view to break down silos to improve equity and access. GHA brought its voice and advocacy experience to the field of gender equality, sexual and reproductive health and rights at the Generation Equality Forum and nutrition at the Nutrition for Growth Summit. GHA also encourages decision-makers to think about the links between growing environmental destruction and increasing pandemics and how adopting a more holistic approach including the management of natural resources is required to protect public health.



 At the Nutrition for Growth Summit in Tokyo, the Commission announced a new pledge of €2.5 billion for 2021-2024 to reduce all forms of malnutrition.

 At the Paris-held Generation **Equality Forum, the UN Women-convened summit** to accelerate gender quality investment, France committed €100 million (US\$122 million) in sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) for the next five years.



Meeting with Deputy General Director of INTPA: GHA's worked through the Generation Nutrition (GN) coalition to mobilise the EU Commissioner for International Partnerships Jutta Urpilainen by linking the fight against malnutrition to other EU priorities, issuing recommendations linked to the EU Multiannual budget, malnutrition and COVID-19 malnutrition and education and issuing a financial ask for the Summit


GHA created links with feminist organisations by developing new tools and tactics (podcasts. newsletter, cartoons) and established new partnerships with organisations working on SRHR.


